What is a Columbarium?

A columbarium is a special place on church grounds (our cemetery is Church grounds) for the inurnment of ashes of deceased church members and their immediate families. Columbarium is Latin for a nesting place for doves. For centuries, the dove has symbolized the Holy Spirit. Early Christians, therefore, associated the small compartments occupied by domesticated doves with storage facilities for cremated remains of their loved ones and friends. It is a garden area that is a quiet and serene place in which to honor the deceased members of the church and their families to contemplate, reflect and pray.

Cannon Law States:

Can. 1176 §3. The Church earnestly recommends that the pious custom of burying the bodies of the deceased be observed; nevertheless,

the Church does not prohibit cremation

unless it was chosen for reasons contrary to Christian doctrine.

Where does the Church Stand?

The Church teaches that we place the same respect to cremated remains as those given to full-body interments. As soon as possible after the cremation, our remains should be interred or entombed (in whole) within the consecrated grounds of the Catholic Cemeteries.

Why have a Columbarium?

A Columbarium houses burial chambers in which cremated remains are placed in a niche. Each niche identifies the person's name just as a monument does for a burial site. A columbarium burial in no way changes funeral services or memorial services for the deceased. This is just an alternative to the ground burial. Placing the ashes of the deceased in a niche in the Columbarium is a respectful, simple way to show honor to a deceased love one. A Columbarium offers an environmentally sensitive solution to the traditional ground burial, therefore, extending the life of an existing cemetery.
